### A Little Bit of This and That for August...

It is hard to believe that this summer is flying by and in a few short weeks the kids will be back in school. I hope that you all have had time to relax and enjoy the summer. This has been a busy summer for me. It started with a trip to St. Lucia to officiate at my nephew's wedding Memorial Day weekend and will end with the trip to Florida near the end of this month to see my mother who at 95 is in a memory care facility. Time with family is precious time and I am grateful for the opportunity to travel to be with family.

Time with our church family is also precious. When I am not with you, I miss you. In the now four years that I have been journeying with you, I feel so blessed by God. You are an amazing group of people and I feel blessed to serve as your pastor.

As a church family, we are called to spread the love of Jesus to all around us. This summer I have been focusing on the Holy Spirit to listen and ask for more of God to be at work in me through the power of the Holy Spirit. I also pray that for each of you as I wonder what God still wants to do in our midst. Each of us is important in the body of Christ as we all have gifts to make a difference in the ministry and lives of the people around us. So, I have been praying for more of Jesus and more of the Holy Spirit to come in power to allow us to discern and know how to further the kingdom of God.

One of the words that has been on my mind is the word, sanctification which simply means to be changed or transformed in our journey of faith. You see, it is the Holy Spirit who helps us to live into the transformational process of God at work in our lives. It is the Holy Spirit that calls us to faith in Jesus. Listening for the Holy Spirit is a risk, though. Author and Pastor Mark Batterson emphasizes in his book, <u>Whisper</u> that we need to allow for the quiet moments in our days to listen for the voice of God. It is often in the silence that we can finally get an impression of what God wants to speak into us. It is an important part of our transformational journey.

I know that in this busy and noisy world we live in, that the process of creating the time and space to get quiet before God can be a little bit difficult and even scary. We wonder... what will God ask me to do and what if I think I cannot step into that? Do I really want to follow Jesus?

I have been looking at how the Holy Spirit works and I think the process of risking to follow is an important part of the journey. God does not force us to follow, but the Holy Spirit is always present saying, "Come. I will meet you and help you." You see, it is God who calls and God who equips. The Holy Spirit is our helper.

So, as we begin to think about a new year, which in my mind always begins when the kids go back to school, I have been praying about possible practices and opportunities that the Holy Spirit is calling us to risk to step into at St. Peter? How is God calling each of us to go deeper in the transformational process of faith?

Pastor Doug and I were privileged to attend the Rostered Ministers' Gathering in Phoenix from July 17-20<sup>th</sup>. We learned what it was to be out in temperatures around 118 degrees and learned that it felt just like walking into a sauna, but without the moisture. We were able to participate in worship and learning with over 700 rostered ministers. The experience in worship and in listening to the keynote speakers was amazing. The focus was on rekindling the gifts within us. We had an opportunity to also go to breakout sessions on all kinds of topics. I am thankful for the opportunity to attend and to continue to learn and grow my faith.

Ideas to ponder for the sanctification process in our lives: There are many more than these, but these are a few to get you thinking.

1. Carve out time at the beginning and end of each day to sit in silence and ponder how God has been at work and/or just be aware of God being present with you.

- 2. Participate in a small group Bible Study or Home Share group where you can risk to open up and share your faith and listen to others share theirs.
- 3. Risk to pray out loud and pray for others as they tell you of their pain or concerns.
- 4. Participate in a group to learn about Healing Prayer and God's ability to bring deep healing.

5. Sing in a young people's group to provide special music during the service. The act of praising God in song is powerful.

- 6. Volunteer for Lifewise one morning or afternoon a week and pray for the children and teachers.
- 7. Go visiting to those who are homebound or in the nursing homes.

8. Ask God to speak to you as you sit quietly and then begin to journal what comes to mind. Then share what you are hearing with a few trusted friends who are also journaling.

The journey of faith is an exciting one. God is amazing and his love for us is transforming. As we seek God with our whole heart God meets us on the journey. That is great news!

Dear Friends in Christ,

The Northwestern Ohio Synod mission is: Sent by the crucified and risen Jesus to Make Disciples, Equip Leaders, Strengthen Parishes, and Nurture New Communities for the renewal of Northwest Ohio and the world.

Sent...we are a sent church, each one of us. We are sent into the communities in which we live, play, work, and worship to engage those whom God places in our lives each day. This is such an important perspective on how we live our lives...God's calling us to "be church" right where we are and not wait for Sunday morning at 10am. Although most of us love our Sunday morning rituals and many of us find strength there, our mission and our scriptures remind us that "church" is that, but it is also soooooo much more, sooooo much bigger. Church is not only about our own relationship with our creator and our savior, but also with the one who gifts us with each other and sends us out into the world - the Holy Spirit - as we witness in Pentecost when the Spirit was gifted to us and breathed on us through those disciples so long ago.

With the gift of The Holy Spirit, we get to look up and out as a church together. Did you know there are 140 Lutheran member churches of The Lutheran World Federation (LWF)? Isn't that amazing? We, the ELCA, are part of a Lutheran body that exists all over the world in 140 different iterations of Lutheran doctrine and perspective. As such, each of the 65 synods of the ELCA has at least one official international church relationship that we call a "companion synod." These relationships are concrete expressions of the communion and fellowship we are called into as the Body of Christ.

### Why are companion synod relationships important?

The relationship with all of our companion synods are important because we learn so much about "accompaniment," which promotes the values of mutuality, inclusivity, vulnerability, empowerment and sustainability. It is truly a give and take, total sharing relationship as we learn how God is at work throughout the church around the world. We learn from them and they learn from us as together we nurture and strengthen one another for life and ministry through prayer, study, communication, exchange of visitors and sharing of resources.



What we learned on our most recent trip is that the NWOS relationship with the ELCT Dodoma Diocese is a big deal in many ways, not the least of which is because the ELCT is the second largest Lutheran body in the world with 7,000,000 members and growing. There is so much we learn when we engage with our brothers and sisters in Tanzania about evangelism and mission, the excitement of the Spirit in everyday life, building relationship with "the least of these" in a wide-variety of services and education, entrepreneurship that villages and churches are creating and living out, and culture shifts weaving tribal traditions into a new Spirit-filled, vibrant church that leans into living everyday with the purpose of sharing faith and bringing more disciples to faith.

It is also a big deal because the city of Dodoma is now the Capital of the country of Tanzania. We saw the President of Tanzania on the weekend of Bishop Christian Ndoza's consecration, and the Vice President was in attendance and spoke at the Consecration as well. The city is growing by leaps and bounds: new housing, so much traffic, new businesses and restaurants, markets and commerce. It is a vibrant city and the Lutheran Church is right in the middle of it all, sharing the Good News and influencing how the city, the government and the church is growing and evolving.



We did our best to launch all of our Vacation Bible School participants on a cosmic quest where they had a blast learning how to shine Jesus' light to the world. We had 72 kids registered and averaged 62 in attendance each night. Our 48 volunteers rocked it, and we could **NOT** have done this event without them.

We kicked off on Sunday, July 9 and were in session from 6 p.m.-8:30 p.m. through Wednesday. On Thursday night, we kicked off Family Night with all of the kids singing and singing songs that they learned for the parents, grandparents, and friends that they invited. Then, we did some minute-to-win-it games with a boys versus the girls. The girls won, so Pastor Wayne got a pie in his face. Our mission project this year was raising money for Delphos Lifewise. Everyone responded very generously, and we collected \$1,209.45. This was a competition too, and the boys won, so Mrs. Tobe had to kiss a dog in front of everyone. After some pictures with our astronaut, Astro, that had been with us all week, the kids, their families, and some of the volunteers headed to the Delphos Pool to swim and enjoy Kona Ice and snacks.

It takes many hands to make this outreach project happen, and everyone involved did their best to take the kids on an out-ofthis world adventure while helping them to build their faith and have some fun. #### **Healing Prayer Principles**

- 1. Discern God's will Ask if, what & how you should pray for healing
- 2. Ask Permission of the person before you pray for them or touch them
- 3. Touch skin to skin, the afflicted area if possible and if appropriate
- 4. Visualize God flowing through you & making the person whole
- 5. Pray according to your healing gifts and your faith
- 6. Simple & Short, Clear & Direct Request not "if it be your will"
- 7. Give Thanks for what is being done
